Mayor's Message

I encourage residents to be involved and informed as much as possible. Reading this newsletter is a good way to start. The Mayor and Council meet every other Tuesday at 7pm at the Borough Hall. Downtown Comes Alive

Members of The Downtown Steering Committee have been meeting regularly since February 21st in order to recommend to the Mayor and Council ways to increase the success of Spring Lake's business district. The Committee has researched successful business management models in New Jersey in order to identify best practices.

Updates at the Beach.....

What's Happening with the North End Pavilion?

On June 12th at 6:00pm, the Borough Council will hold a workshop meeting and discussion on the planned reconstruction of the North End Pool and Pavilion at Borough Hall. Design Ideas (formerly known as Tomaino, Tomaino and Iamello) has prepared architectural drawings which incorporate nearly two years of discussion and feedback from the Borough Council and members of the public. The proposed project includes improvements and upgrades to the pavilion and pool, lockers, bathrooms and the perimeter wall. Please join the Borough Council for this important discussion. The regular Council meeting will begin at 8:00pm.

Progress on the Boards

As part of the Borough Council's efforts to improve the quality of the boardwalk, the new railings that were recently installed as part of the boardwalk extension were continued south along the boardwalk toward North End pavilion. Plans are underway to continue these railings the full length of the boardwalk as budget permits.



The next phase of the Arch Area Restoration should begin this Fall. These improvements include the repair of the deteriorated arches, the removal of the rusted guard rail, and the repair and rebuilding of the crumbling seawall. The project will also include new sidewalks, curbing and landscaping between the start of the boardwalk extension and the arches. Recognizing how important this project is to pedestrian safety, the Monmouth County Board of Freeholders has committed a \$350,000 grant toward the project.

Dog Census

The Borough will be conducting a door-to-door census of unlicensed dogs as required by state statute. Owners of unlicensed dogs face a possible summons and fine, therefore, we urge you to take this opportunity to obtain a license for your dog (a valid rabies certificate must be presented). The Borough ordinance states that cats must be licensed as well.

You may obtain your dog and cat licenses at the Municipal Building, Fifth and Warren Avenues between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Bike Safety

School is closing soon and there will be more children and teenagers on bicycles and skateboards sharing our streets. We also remind parents that all children 14 years of age and younger are required by NJ State Law to wear helmets. Safety helmets for all bike riders are recommended.

New Life for Wreck Pond?

On Monday, May 14th, Congressman Chris Smith and Congressman Jim Oberstar, Chair of the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, visited the Borough to discuss Wreck Pond and the local watershed. Aware that the pond is dying and that water from the pond contributes to ocean pollution and serious local flooding, the Congressmen, as well as the DEP and the Army Corp of Engineers, held a briefing to understand the problem and discuss possible mitigation. Along with the Mayor and Council, the briefing was attended by representa-

tives from Sea Girt, Spring Lake Heights and Clean Ocean Action. The first step is to fund the Army Corp to complete its study of the pond and submit its recommendations. The Congressmen assured us that this funding would be obtained shortly and would be a necessary component before any mitigation could be considered. The end goal, of course, is to dredge Wreck Pond back to a healthy depth, and the Mayor and Council will continue to work with local, state and federal officials to obtain funding for this important project.

Planning underway for our Historic First Aid Building



Even though the historic First Aid Building is no longer used to house our volunteer squad, the Borough has not forgotten about it nor has the Spring Lake Preservation Alliance. The Spring Lake Preservation Alliance recently applied for funds from the New Jersey Historic Trust on behalf of the Borough. Thanks to

their efforts, Spring Lake was recently awarded a \$49,000 grant. The grant money will be used to hire a planner/architect to begin the planning phase of the renovation project. During this phase, the use of the space within the building, as well as the improvements to the exterior, will be discussed and formalized. Moving forward, the Borough plans to apply for grant funds to offset construction costs.

Housing Rehabilitation

Master Plan Update

For over 33 years the development of Spring Lake has been guided by the current Master Plan. Although the Master Plan has been amended periodically, so much has changed since its adoption that the Borough Council has initiated a study to completely review and update the plan.

This process is now underway. We met recently with Birdsall Engineering (the experienced consulting firm selected to assist us) to discuss

the project schedule, obtain related documents and reports and begin creating a list of the many Borough organizations and stakeholders they will be meeting during the information gathering portion of the study.



The planning effort will include a statement of objectives and a land use plan, as well as plans for hous-

ing, roads and traffic, utility service, Borough buildings and schools, recreation, conservation, business, historic preservation and recycling.

Our initial goal is to learn as much as we can from everyone interested in participating in this critically important project. We plan to share these ideas with you at several major presentations. Stay posted!

She will be the North End Supervisor.

A new face you will see this year is Janet Carbin. Janet is a teacher at Jackson Memorial High School. She has also been on the Manasquan beach for 25 years as a guard and captain. Janet will be the Lifeguard Supervisor this summer and you will see her on all of the beaches! The four supervisors have plenty experience and they plan to make this summer season run smoothly. Badges went on sale, Saturday, May 5th. The South End office is open weekends from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. and weekdays from 3 p.m.- 5 p.m.. The North End pool opened Saturday, May 26th and will be open until September 16th. The South End pool will open

June 9th until September 30th. Main beaches opened for weekends May 26th and all beaches open June 23rd.

Swim Team and Junior Lifeguard sign ups will be Saturday, June 2nd from 9 a.m. – 11 a.m. at Marucci Park. This year's swim team will be coached by Colleen Panzini and Cathy Miksic. They bring a tremendous amount of both swimming and parenting experience to the team! Both programs are open to children ages 6-16.

Train Station Renamed...

By mid July, the Train Station building will have a whole new look....and name! With a \$29K Community Development Block Grant obtained from Monmouth County and an \$8,500 contribution from the Borough, the newly renamed "Spring Lake Recreation Center" will boast new bathrooms and the entire building will be handicapped accessible. Planned as a

multi-use public building, the Spring Lake Recreation Center will be used for Borough activities and programs for seniors, children and other interested parties. Thanks to the creativity and energy of the Recreation Commission and the generosity of a local resident, the inte-

rior of the building will also get a face lift including a wide screen TV, furniture and other leisure items. In recognition of all of the past financial support the building has received from the Spring Lake Five Race, the walls will be decorated with vintage photographs and race memorabilia.

Improvements Rolling Along...

Roads to be Paved

Work will begin shortly to complete paving projects on Tuttle and Ludlow Avenues.

In more good news, the Borough was awarded a DOT grant in the amount of \$172,000 for paving and curb work to South Blvd. The balance of the cost of this project will come from the portion of the Borough's capital budget that has been set aside for the ongoing roads program.

Playground at the Lake

The Borough, in partnership with the Spring Lake Recreation, will be replacing the playground equipment in Divine Park. Beginning the week of June 4th, the existing equipment will be removed to make way for new equipment. The new park will be welcoming visitors at the end of June.

Marucci Park Gets Facelift

Baseball season is well underway and thanks to the combined efforts of the Spring Lake-Sea Girt Little League and the Borough workforce, the main fields at Marucci Park have never looked better. The outfield and soccer field, however, need improvement. Beginning in August, these two fields will be closed to allow for re-seeding and fertilization. They will remain closed until next Spring. In addition, the parking lot at Marucci Park will be completely repaved once the baseball season has ended.

We are planning to update the Marucci Fields. As an initial improvement to the park, the playing fields will be reseeded and fenced off so that they will be ready to play on next spring. In the fall the parking area will be paved and landscaped.

Recycling Center Reminders

There are designated containers for disposing of the following items: (Please read labels on the containers) **NEWSPAPERS, MIXED PAPER, INCLUDING JUNK MAIL, TELEPHONE BOOKS AND MAGAZINES.** There is an area for **METAL ITEMS** such as appliances, bicycles and large heavy metal objects (no refrigerators, air conditioners, freezers, or dehumidifiers). There is a container for **LEAVES – No Grass.** Containers are also marked for **CORRUGATED CARDBOARD** (empty

boxes), **BULKY HOUSEHOLD ITEMS** (NO construction materials), **CO-MINGLED** (glass bottles and jars, bi-metal and aluminum food and beverage cans, plastic pourable containers, no larger than one gallon), **BRUSH** (tree limbs, hedge and shrubbery trimmings), and **CLOTHING BINS (AMVETS).** **AGAIN, PLEASE PLACE ITEMS IN THE APPROPRIATE CONTAINER. ALL CONTAINERS ARE CLEARLY LABELED.**

For safety’s sake, residents may not scavenge from the containers. If

you accidentally drop or discard something, please see an attendant for assistance. After you have emptied your containers, please exit the facility in a timely manner. This will limit the wait time for those entering the facility.

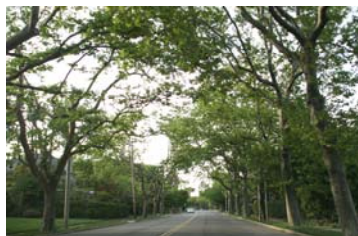

Money from the Borough Tree Fund (established to insure that home demolitions and development would not decimate our tree stock) will be used to plant more shade trees so that Spring Lake will ultimately achieve the beautiful canopies that we associate with the more lovely streets in town.

Be Prepared.....

DO YOU KNOW ABOUT SPRING LAKE'S EMERGENCY WARNING SYSTEM?

The Spring Lake Office of Emergency Management (OEM) has initiated several new emergency warning capabilities to provide timely information to Spring Lake families. This includes the establishment of an AM broadcast station (1640 AM) that broadcasts NOAA weather radio updates daily, and will include emergency warning messages when necessary. The Borough also has installed an emergency siren with a loudspeaker capability.

A major addition to the warning system is Reverse 911. This capability (called Code Red) will enable the Borough to provide emergency message calls to your phone. Emergency messages can be sent to the entire town (in the event of a hurricane for example), to sections or blocks within the town (as a flood warning to residents living near one of the lakes) or to special groups of residents (like school families in the event of a school closing). There will be an option for you to add your cell phones or other numbers to the calling database. Additional information will be provided on the Borough web page shortly. We recommend that each family take the time to establish your own family emergency plan, keep the emergency information handy and be alert to Spring Lake emergency bulletins.

Flood Information

The Borough of Spring Lake is participating with the Federal Insurance Agency in the "Community Rating System" which may result in the reduction of Federal flood insurance premiums for all Borough policyholders. We are required to notify all homeowners of this program and of the flooding potential in the Borough of Spring Lake.

Flood Hazards

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has classified some areas of the Borough of Spring Lake as a special flood hazard area, otherwise known as the 100-Year Flood Plain. As required by FEMA, flood maps have been developed for the Borough of Spring Lake. The maps show flood zones and the predicted elevations that a 100-year storm could reach or exceed.

Oceanfront properties are vulnerable to storm damage during severe northeasters and hurricane conditions. Flooding can come with little warning. Even though they appear to move slowly (three feet per second) a flood two feet deep can knock a man off his feet and float a car. Our dunes are considered important. They are our first lines of defense against the onslaught of the incoming seas. Preserving those dunes is of the utmost importance. The Borough of Spring Lake maintains strict standards for dune restoration and preservation. Other properties that are susceptible border on the shores of Wreck Pond, Spring Lake and Lake Como. During the 1992 Northeaster certain streets at the southeast end of town experienced flooding over two feet, which did not completely dissipate for 48 hours.

Flood Insurance

Approximately fifteen percent of the Borough of Spring Lake homeowners carry Federal flood insurance. Keep in mind that the standard homeowner's insurance policy does not cover flood losses. In the regular Federal flood insurance programs, coverage of up to \$185,000 is available for single-family dwellings and up to \$250,000 for other residential dwellings. Up to \$60,000 contents coverage is available for the above. All homeowners are strongly urged to carry Federal flood insurance. Information on flood insurance may be obtained from your local insurance agent, or call the National Flood Insurance Program at 1-800-638-6620.

Flood Services

The first thing you should do is check your flood hazard. The Spring Lake Library has publications dealing with flood-related topics, such as, flood proofing, elevated structures, flood maps, flood emergency and flood insurance. This information can be helpful if you are in a floodplain or have experienced a flood, drainage or sewer backup problem. You may call the Construction Official, Albert Ratz, Jr. if you have a question or need additional information.

Flood Proofing

The best way to minimize storm damage to your home is to raise it on pilings so that the lowest habitable floor is at or above your base flood elevation. Current cost estimates for this varies from \$20,000 to \$25,000 and your flood insurance premiums could be significantly reduced. Another approach is to make your walls waterproof and place watertight closures over the doorways. This method is not recommended for houses with basements or if water will get over two feet deep. The inexpensive and easy task of installing flood vents in your home can also reduce storm damage. You may contact Albert Ratz, Jr., Construction Official at 732-449-3252.

What Can You Do?

Spring Lake depends on your cooperation and assistance. Please remember the Borough of Spring Lake has ordinances, which prohibit the disposal of litter upon any public or private property other than in a litter receptacle. It is also unlawful for a person to sweep into or deposit in any gutter street, catch basin or other public place any accumulation of litter from any public or private sidewalk or driveway.

Always check with the Building Department before you build on, alter, re-grade or fill on your property to ensure that projects do not cause problems on other properties and to ascertain whether a permit is needed for the work.

Flood Warning

When severe storms are forecasted for the Borough of Spring Lake, radio stations WADB (95.9 FM) and WJLK (1310 AM-94.3 FM) and Monmouth Cable TV will broadcast emergency information. The AM Alert Radio Station 1640 will operate 24 hours a day and continuously broadcast NOAA weather radio updates. If evacuation is required, the police will use the P.A. systems on all police cars to alert and instruct residents. The Borough of Spring Lake has an Emergency Management Plan, which is under the supervision of Police Chief Robert Dawson.

Flood Safety

If someone in your home would need to be evacuated by ambulance, please notify the Health Department in advance. In an emergency, contact the Police if the Health Department does not have you on file. Knowing how high your property is above mean sea level will give you an idea how vulnerable your property is to storm damage. Your FLOOD ELEVATION CERTIFICATE, or property survey may have this information.

The Federal Insurance Administration suggests the following action when coastal storms or hurricanes are imminent:

- * **Turn off all electrical power at panel**
- * Some appliances such as television sets, keep electri-

cal charges even after they have been unplugged. Don't use appliances or motors that have gotten wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned and dried.

- * **Close main gas valve** Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Don't smoke or use candles, lanterns, or open flames unless you know the gas has been turned off and the area has been ventilated.
- * **Move household items to the highest level you can** Also cardboard boxes and newspapers, as these materials disintegrate and will clog drains and vents
- * **Keep a full tank of gas**
- * **Do not walk through flowing water**
- * Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths, mostly during flash floods. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet.
- * **Stay away from power lines and electrical wires**
- * The number two flood killer after drowning is electrocution. Electrical current can travel through water. Report downed power lines to power company.

If you evacuate your home, here are some essential items you should take:

First Aid Supplies
Cell Phone
Prescription Medication
Supply of Non-Perishable Food
Batteries (Hearing aid, flashlight)
Battery-operated Portable Radio
Blankets
Dry Clothing - Especially Shoes and Socks
Important Papers
Bank and Check Books
Valuable and Cherished Items
Games for Children and Adults

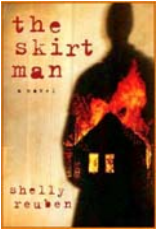

DON'T SWEEP, BLOW OR RAKE YOUR YARD WASTE INTO THE STREET

REMINDER:

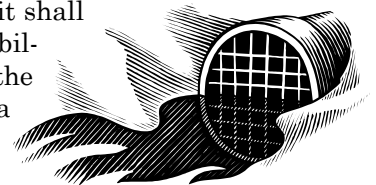
YARD WASTE CAN NOT BE SWEEPED, RAKED, BLOWN OR OTHERWISE PLACED IN THE STREET.
IT SHOULD BE BLOWN ONTO THE LAWN.

Did you know that the Borough has an Ordinance which prohibits you or your landscaper from sweeping, raking or blowing your yard waste into the street? With the exception of leaf pick-up season or on brush pick-up days, no grass clippings or other material should be at the curb.

Why? This material ends up in our sewers, clogs our sewer entrances after a heavy rain and violates storm-water run-off regulations. In addition, it prevents our street sweeper from doing a thorough job on your street.

Please blow excess yard mulch back onto your lawn or sweep and dispose of it.

Please be advised that if yard waste is placed in the street, it must be removed or it shall be deemed a violation and a summons could be issued. It is the homeowner's responsibility to notify its employees or contractors. Violations of any the Borough Code of the Borough of Spring Lake provides for a penalty upon conviction of imprisonment for a term not exceeding 90 days, or by a fine not exceeding \$2,000, or by a period of community service not exceeding 90 days.
