Council President Judge called the Regular Meeting of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Spring Lake to order at 7:00 P.M. with a moment of silent prayer. He then proceeded with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. Council President Judge announced that the meeting is being held in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act.

Council Comments & Staff Reports:

Mr. Judge asked Mr. Avakian and Mr. Dempsey if the borough is prepared for the upcoming coastal storm this week. Mr. Dempsey indicated that the gates at Wreck Pond are open and ready to go. Mr. Avakian added that they have been watching the Stephens Institute Code Red Water Elevation System and they are predicting higher water elevations on Friday night into Saturday; he will continue to watch the warnings and adjust the gates as needed in preparation for the storm.

Mr. Drasheff reported that within the coming weeks the water and sewer committee will be looking at updating the water and sewer ordinance; they will not be looking at fees but more housekeeping items. Mr. Drasheff gave the example of the Borough having to replace water meters because they freeze since some homeowners do not have their water shut off while they are not home in the winter or they leave their heat on too low. He explained that the changes will be brought to the council in April.

Mr. Drasheff asked about resolution R-18-041 and asked which health insurance options the Borough will be offering to employees. Mr. Dempsey clarified that they were under the impression that the Borough provided every available health insurance plan that the state offered, when only they were allowed to offer one plan. This resolution will allow employees to choose which insurance option they want.

Mr. Frost reported that the Borough received a letter from DOT (Department of Transportation) awarding the grant for Fifth Avenue. He asked Mr. Avakian where it falls on road paving list, as he

did not see it. Mr. Avakian indicated that it is on the Trust Fund Projects list which is separate than the road paving list. Mr. Dempsey indicated that the grant includes the gutter drains, new curbing, and sidewalk near the Borough yard. Mr. Dempsey added that this project will address the intersection at Warren and Fifth Avenues.

Mr. Sagui asked Mr. Avakian if there was a way to control the water that backs up onto the sidewalk around the handicapped ramp areas. Mr. Avakian explained that the Federal Highway Authority through DOT controls the regulations for handicapped assessable sidewalks. He explained that it is difficult with drainage but an inlet on either side of the curb would probably help.

Mr. Sagui reported that the communications with the residents on Pitney Avenue have not been great with the sewer work being done. Mr. Avakian explained that they have expressed their frustration with the company regarding noticing residents along with Mr. Dempsey. They revised the notice to indicate that residents can use their water but they should avoid using their dishwashers and washing machines.

Ms. Whalley reported that she and Mr. Dempsey went to the JCP&L distribution control center today. They toured the control room and back-up systems and shared that if power is out, you should call and report the outage so that JCP&L is able to isolate the problem faster.

Mr. Whalley continued her report with an update on Devine Park with the removal of trees and mulching; new trees are expected to be planted by May 15th.

Ms. Whalley also reported that the BID (Business Improvement District) has refurbished the trash cans down town and will also be putting in more recycling containers.

Ms. Whalley lastly reported that this weekend will be the last weekend of Bye Bye Birdie at the Community House.

Borough Engineer's Report:

Mr. Avakian reported on the two projects they are close to scheduling including the removal of vegetative growth and restoration of the shore line around Spring Lake along with the tennis court rehabilitation, which both fall under the Monmouth County Open Space Grant.

Mr. Avakian then reported that there are two sections in the road program which include a spring and fall paving for 2018; the spring paving will include roads that can be completed before Memorial Day.

Ms. Whalley asked if there is a plan for the berm at Wreck Pond along Second Avenue. Mr. Avakian indicated that DEP (Department of Environmental Protection) asked for modifications to the design and to secure a permit.

Borough Attorney's Report:

Mr. Colao has two items to discuss in closed session.

Borough Administrator's Report:

Mr. Dempsey reported that he met with Asphalt Paving Systems to discuss and receive pricing to micro-surface Pitney and Prospect Avenues, Pitney to Monroe Avenue, and Monroe Avenue to the Lake Como boarder. He also asked about pricing for Morris Avenue, including only the travel lane. Mr. Drasheff added that if they do micro-surface Morris, they need to micro-surface the entire road and not just the travel lane. Mr. Avakian added that Morris Avenue is included in their plans.

Mr. Judge questioned if it is above bid threshold. Mr. Dempsey indicated that they are under state contract

Ms. Whalley added that there are some sinkholes around the Lake which should be addressed before the fishing contest. Mr. Dempsey added that these holes are further away from the lake and will look into addressing them before the fishing contest whether it is to cone off the areas or fill with gravel and dirt.

Business Items Under Consideration:

Event Application- Jersey Shore Relay- April 21st, 2018 - Mr. Erbe offered a motion to approve the request, seconded by Mr. Drasheff. All in favor. None opposed.

PUBLIC HEARING NOW OPEN

Mr. Dempsey explained that this ordinance is for the designation of the Belmar Fire Prevention Bureau as the agency for Spring Lake through shared services.

Mr. Judge indicated that Spring Lake's fire prevention officers retired this past year and this plan to join with Belmar provides a cost-effective solution.

Mr. Drasheff asked about how fees will be handled. Mr. Dempsey added that fees will still be collected the same way and that Fire Prevention education will still be in the schools.

Ms. Whalley asked if the fire official is all set with business cards and letter head. Mr. Dempsey reported that the fire official is all set up with a Spring Lake email address, business cards, and letterhead.

Rich Clayton, 1307 Third Avenue stated that his business was inspected several weeks ago and felt that he was thorough. Mr. Clayton is not in favor of out sourcing but feels that this is a good fit.

Mr. Erbe offered a motion to close the public hearing for Ordinance No. 2018-001, seconded by Mr. Drasheff. All in favor. None opposed.

Section 1.

§180-17. Agency designation.

The local enforcement agency shall be the Bureau of Fire Prevention of the Borough of Spring Lake, which is hereby created in the Spring Lake Fire Department and within the Borough of Spring Lake. <u>The local</u> enforcement agency shall be the Belmar Bureau of Fire Prevention.

Section 2.

This ordinance shall take effect on upon passage and publication in accordance with applicable law.

Public Comments:

Tom Polk, 100 Howell Avenue asked Mr. Drasheff for clarification on the issue of frozen water meters. Mr. Drasheff explained that the current ordinance does not give the borough the authority to charge the resident to replace the water meter after a water emergency.

Mr. Polk continued to ask if it is possible to put an illuminated speed limit sign on Third Avenue at the entrance to Spring Lake. Mr. Dempsey explained that there was an illuminated sign, which was recently hit in an accident, and it will be replaced.

Mr. Polk continued that he is under the impression that whenever utilities tear up the street they are responsible for putting down the first patch of pavement and do not return for a second layer. He

doesn't see why the Borough doesn't require the utility company to pay to repair the road. Mr. Dempsey responded many roads in town have half width paving, which has been done by the utility company; recently on Third Avenue the Borough went ahead and paved the road. The Borough will infrared the trenches one year after letting them settle; this is for water and sewer repairs.

Mr. Erbe added that the Borough has a very vibrant road program. They do microsurface roadways that are in need of repair, they also have the county occasionally come in pave if needed. He continued that when the utilities come in they do a great job but typically they only pave half of the road.

Mr. Polk continued that there are a few pot holes in town. Mr. Sagui explained that many of the potholes are due to the snowplows in the winter; the borough has to wait until warmer weather for asphalt companies to open back up. After they open public works will go around down and fill in pot holes.
